### COVID-19 - Contingency Plan

### September 2021

#### Introduction

The key principles set out in the contingency framework are:

- maximise the number of children in face-to-face education and minimise any disruption in a way that best manages the COVID-19 risk
- managing transmission should be weighed against any educational interruptions
- measures should affect the minimum number of children for the shortest time
- attendance restrictions advised as a last resort

We are required to update our contingency plan and describe how we will respond if children, pupils or staff test positive for COVID-19 and how we will operate if we are advised to reintroduce any measures to help break chains of transmission. Such measures should be considered in addition to the day to day control measures being implemented by settings, and will fall in to the following categories:

- 1. Baseline control measures (green) we can implement any of these without additional support/approval and prior to an outbreak
- 2. Additional outbreak control measures we should consider these actions when a threshold is met.
- 3. Enhanced outbreak control measures some, or all of these measures may be recommended following a risk assessment with local authority public health
- 4. Exceptional outbreak control measures these measures may be recommended in exceptional circumstances following a joint risk assessment (Education and Public Health) via an Outbreak Control Team (OCT) meeting

The DfE has now defined 'thresholds' to indicate that transmission may be occurring within a setting and additional control measures may be needed. For Askwith Primary School, it is whichever of these thresholds is reached first:

- 5 children, pupils or staff, who are likely to have mixed closely, test positive for COVID-19 within a 10-day period; or
- 10% of children, pupils or staff, who are likely to have mixed closely, test positive for COVID-19 within a 10-day period.

There are additional health protection thresholds for support:

- there are any admissions to hospital for ARI/COVID-19
- · we are having problems implementing the control measures
- we have applied the control measures and are still seeing a significant rise in cases

Please note the following considerations should attendance be restricted for any reason:

## Remote Learning

High-quality remote learning will be provided for all pupils if:

- they have tested positive for COVID-19 but are well enough to learn from home; or
- attendance at school has been temporarily restricted (See Remote Learning Policy)

#### Safeguarding measures

- review Child Protection policy to make sure it reflects any local restrictions and remains effective.
- aim to have a trained DSL (Lisa Longford) or Deputy DSL (Elaine Nayler) on site wherever possible.

#### Enhanced Outbreak Control Measures

Some, or all of these measures may be recommended following a risk assessment with Local Authority Public Health. These are likely to be considered when:

- there is evidence of transmission within the setting, and additional measures will add value in reducing the risk of ongoing transmission; and/or
- there are multiple groups within the setting who meet the threshold for considering additional action (as this may indicate increased risk of transmission within the setting)

When should n child self-isolat or miss school	te
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- All children MUST attend school unless they are ill.
- From 16<sup>th</sup> August 2021, children under 18 (or double vaccinated adults) do not need to self-isolate, or miss school if a member of their household or a contact, has COVID.
- Instead, they need to book a PCR test but can continue coming to school so long as they have no symptoms and they have received a negative PCR test result.





- If your child develops COVID symptoms at home, they should stay at home and should book a PCR test, (NOT a Lateral Flow test).
- If your child develops COVID symptoms at school, they will be sent home and you should book them a PCR test.
- If your child tests positive for COVID, they will need to selfisolate. The rest of the household does not need to selfisolate if they are under 18 or fully vaccinated – but instead should book a PCR test.
