The main changes are in yellow and include;

- Domestic Residential visits taking place from next week
- Face coverings no longer a requirement for secondary pupils to wear these in school BUT the unions and Amanda Newbold (NYCC Assistant Director of CYPS) agreed that asking pupils to wear them in areas outside the classrooms was best practice. I have put this in the risk assessment but it is up to secondary schools themselves whether to implement this or not
- There is no change to seats being in rows, group sizes or mixing of groups
